Attendance at Deans Primary School

Please help us develop, in your child, a regular habit of good time keeping. If circumstances arise when your child will be unavoidably late please let us know if you can. Our school enters pupil absence electronically using codes for particular reasons for absence.

Our school has a system which sends out an automated text message to a mobile telephone in cases of unexplained absence. The text is repeated regularly until answered. Parents/carers and schools must work in partnership in order to benefit from early notification of unexplained absence from school. If your child is absent from school for any reason, please contact us by phone (01506 283171, option 1) as soon after 8am in the morning as possible.

It's your job to contact the school early on the first morning of your child's absence and provide an explanation. If the school is not contacted then a Group Call (text) alert will be sent. It is essential that you contact the school as soon as possible. If no contact is made, the school will follow WLC policy and report this absence to the Children and Young People's Team and, if no contact is made by then, the police will be informed as this is about your child's safety.

As part of West Lothian's attendance policy, we look at pupil attendance on a regular basis. If your child's attendance falls below 90%, this will be followed up with a letter, informing you of this, as well as the opportunity to look at how we, as a school, can support your child and your family to attend school.

Regular updates around attendance are included in our monthly school newsletter.

Below is a handy guide below here which shows how many days missed our key percentages relate to. It makes for very interesting reading. I appreciate your ongoing support with this. If there is anything you feel we could be doing to support you or your child with attendance, then please contact me at the school.

90% attendance – 17 full days lost 85% attendance – 26 full days lost 80% attendance – 35 full days lost 75% attendance – 41 full days lost 70% attendance – 50 full days lost

Any days lost in learning result in gaps. Every day in our school is exceptionally busy and the children experience a wide range of learning. Fridays are also filled with learning. Every minute in school counts for our children!

Time off during the school term

Attendance at school is monitored according to West Lothian Council guidelines.

A child's progress can be hindered by poor attendance at school as he/she misses out on valuable learning opportunities. This prevents him/her achieving their full potential.

We monitor attendance regularly and send out information letters to parents who may not have realised just how often their child has missed school. If attendance does not improve the Children and Young People's Team is contacted and a home visit may be made.

For continuity of your child's learning, we would ask you to refrain from taking your child out of school on holiday during term time. Where such a holiday is unavoidable, please inform the school as early as possible before the event. These absences are recorded as "unauthorised."

School Dress Code

In accordance with West Lothian Council policy, we expect all Deans pupils to follow our dress code. We consider it important that pupils come to school wearing our school colours - red and white. These colours can be combined with grey and black. A suitable code of dress has been established:

- * Deans Primary red waterproof jacket
- * Red or black fleece/cardigan/v-neck jumper (available with school logo)
- * Red or white t-shirt (available with school logo)
- * Red or white polo shirt (available with school logo)
- * white shirt/blouse
- * Deans Primary sweatshirt (red for P1-6 and black for P7 only available with logo)
- * Grey/black trousers/shorts
- * Grey/black skirt
- * Red/white checked summer dresses
- * Deans Primary school tie
- * Deans Primary school badge

Uniform can also be purchased from local shops to ensure we are keeping the cost of the school day as low as we can. If you need any help or support around uniform, please contact us and we will be more than happy to help.

Football strips should not be worn to school.

We ask parents/carers to please ensure that **all** garments are either named or marked in a way that can be identified. It is important that gym shoes and wellington boots should also be marked. For art and craft work, it is helpful if parents provide their child with an old shirt or overall (again, named) to keep in school.

Our Curriculum at Deans

Every child and young person in Scotland is entitled to experience a broad general education, as described by the Scottish Government's Curriculum for Excellence. The curriculum is organised into eight broad categories.

Expressive arts

Includes art and design, dance, drama and music.

Health and wellbeing

Mental, emotional, social and physical wellbeing, planning for choices and changes, PE, activity and sport, food and health, substance misuse and relationships, sexual health and parenthood.

Languages

Includes learning about English as well as our cluster focus for Modern Languages on French and Spanish.

Numeracy and Mathematics

Includes using real life experiences to make predictions, connect to other things, provide skills to understand and examine information, simplify and solve problems, assess risk and make informed decisions. We use Number Talks across our school to encourage our children to use a range of strategies to solve problems.

Religious and moral education

Includes exploring the world's major religions as well as views that are non-religious. Your child will think about their own beliefs and values. Children learn about Christian practice in worship and the place of Christian action in the community. Children will also study other world religions in line with national guidelines.

Sciences

Includes learning about the natural world and living things, forces, chemical changes and our senses.

Social studies

Includes developing understanding of the world by learning about other people and their values, in different times, places and circumstances.

Bad Weather

Arrangements are in place to allow children into school a short time before the bell if the weather is really bad. Even in wet/snowy weather children can manage to get themselves out of their outdoor clothes (contrary to what they'd have you believe!). Breakfast Club
